Oregon wine harvest fell by 29% in 2020, but growth continues





Smoke and vintage variation reduced Oregon wine grape harvest 29% in 2020





Benefits of the Report: Grant Applications

 Grant applications strengthened by report data: approvals received by at least 5 wine industry associations in 2021

Benefits of the Report: Pricing and Varietal Reports

 Pricing report and varietal production tables used by growers and winemakers to guide business decisions, including grape contract negotiations, crop insurance









Benefits of the Report: Statewide Planning

 Used for statewide planning programs that include policies to protect agricultural economy








Benefits of the Report: Comparative Data

 Data allows valid comparison of Oregon's industry with other states and countries







Benefits of the Report: Understand Impact Factors

 Helps understand the scope of impact from wildfires, pandemic, and other factors










Benefits of the Report: Media Coverage

History of the Vineyard & Winery Report


- First report in 1981 OSU Dept of Agriculture & Resource Economics

- 2017- present UO Institute for Policy Research & Engagement






20 years of sustained growth






Planted & Harvested Acres, 2001-2020

Data is key...

- IPRE cannot produce the report without industry data
- The number of responses is not the best indicator of data coverage
 - Production ratios are better (e.g., the percent of production in the data compared to industry estimates)
 - Number of data points determine level of disaggregation possible in vineyard report
- Our 2021 goal is to get more than 600 businesses that represent more than 50% of production
- More data is <u>always</u> better
